Employees

University Norms for Admission in UG Courses

- A) Candidates passing Higher Secondary Examination conducted by the WBCHSE or any other equivalent council are eligible for admission in both honours and general course including vocational course within 3 (three) consecutive academic session from the date of qualifying examination.
- B) Candidates passing Higher Secondary Examination from vocational stream conducted by the WBCHSE or any other equivalent council are eligible for admission in general course only including vocational course within 3 (three) consecutive academic session from the date of qualifying examination.
- C) A candidate passed H.S. or equivalent examination with minimum 45% marks in aggregate (to be calculated by adding the marks obtained in 'best five' subjects excluding Environment Studies) or 50% marks in a subject or related subject is eligible to apply for admission in the honours course.
- D) Candidates carrying pass marks in at least five subjects are eligible to apply for general course.
- E) Any candidate seeking admissionin Economics (Hons.) or Accountancy (Hons.) must have obtained 45% marks in Mathematics in Madhyamik or equivalent examination or must have passed in Mathematics in H.S. or equivalent examination. However, for Accountancy (Hons) this condition is not applicable for a student passing H.S. examination/equivalent examination having at least two commerce papers one of which must be either Business Economics including Business Mathematics or Accountancy or any other equivalent subjects.
- F) Any candidate seeking admission in Physics (Hons.) must have passed in Mathematics in H.S. or equivalent examination.
- G) Any candidate seeking admission in Lab. Based subject must have obtained requisite marks in those subject or relevant subjects in H.S. or equivalent examination.
- H) A Part-I Honours candiate, desires to opt for general course, may take admission afresh in the next year as a general student after obtaining necessary permission from University Authorities (Secretary, UG Council for permission & the Controller of Examinations for information). This facility may be given at the cost of losing one chance.
- I) A Part-II Honours candidate, fails to obtain qualifying marks but obtains 30% marks in honours subject, may take admission in Part-III (3rd year) classes as a general student after obtaining necessary permission from University Authorities (Secretary, U.G. Council for permission & the Controller of Examinations for revised mark sheet) in this regard within 30 (thirty) days from the date of publication of result.

Patterns of Examination for All Theoritical Honours/General Papers (Except Comp. English, Comp. MIL & Comp. Env. Subjects)

For a paper of 100 marks in Part-I/ Part-II/ Part-III examination questions will be set for 90 marks and 10 marks be internally assessed by the concerned college covering the entire syllabus.

Pattern of questions for 90 marks:

- a) Long answer type questions: 30 marks having maximum 15 marks in each question.
- b) Semi long answer type question: 40 marks having maximum 08 marks in each question.
- c) Short answer type questions: 20 marks having maximum 04 marks in each question.

Each type of these questions will necessarily be set from all portion of the syllabus and not from a particular portion. These three types of questions will be set in different groups such as:

- (a) Group-A: Long answer type questions.
- (b) Group-B: Semi long answer type questions.
- (c) Group-C: Short answer type questions.

Again there may be sub-group like A (a) and A (b) as required by the contents of syllabus of different subjects.

Internal assessment at college level:

- a) Total marks allotted for internal assessment is fixed at 10 for each theory paper of I00 marks. For a paper of less than 100 marks internal assessment will be proportionately less.
- b) The total marks of each class test will be 20 (twenty) and the total time allotted will be 45 minutes i.e. one class period.
- c) For each Honours papers at least 5 (five) periodical class test will be held throughout the session and internal assessment marks will be awarded proportionately.
- d) For each General papers at least 2 (two) periodical class test of 20 marks each will be
- e) held throughout the session and internal assessment marks will be awarded proportionately.
- f) Candidates, fail to attend the class test, will lose internal assessment marks proportionately.
- g) The casual candidates for any part of the examination (i.e. those who did not qualify/dropped/cancelled results in the previous year) and the compartmental candidates will not be required to sit for the class tests. The marks on the internal assessment for the students will be the same as obtained by them in the previous year when they were regular students.

- a) An honours candidate of Part-II Examination appeared in at least two papers of Hons. Subject and obtained requisite qualifying marks will be qualified for Part-III classes.
- b) A general candidate of Part-Il Examination appeared in at least one paper in each subject and obtained requisite qualifying marks will be qualified for Part-Ill classes.
- c) The results of successful Honours candidates of Part-I examination would be mentioned as HQII and of Part-II Examination would be mentioned as HQIII.
- d) The results of successful General candidates of Part-I Examination would be mentioned as GOII and of Part-II Examination would be mentioned as GOIII.
- e) A student of General course would be awarded first division for obtaining 60% or above marks in aggregate of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III Examination taken together. Similarly second division be awarded for obtaining 45% or above but less than 60% marks and pass without division be awarded for obtaining 30% or above but less than 45% marks.
- f) A student of Honours course would be awarded first class for obtaining 60% or above marks in aggregate of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III Examination taken together in Hons. subject. Similarly second class be awarded for obtaining 40% or above but less than 60% marks.
- g) A student of Honours course appearing Part-III Examination obtains 30% marks or more but less than 40% marks in Honours subject in aggregate of Part-I, Part-II & Part-ID Examination taken together and obtains 30% marks in each Comp. English, Comp. MIL & Comp. Env. subjects, will be declared General Graduate. However, he/she may sit for the Honours Examination in the next year provided he/she has not consumed all the chances after submitting an application for cancellation of his/her result to the Controller of Examinations duly forwarded by the Principal of the college concerned within 30 (thirty) days since the publication of result / issue of marks sheet.
- h) An Hons./General candidate, fails to obtain pass qualifying marks in any one general subject but obtains pass/qualifying marks in other general subjects in any examination, may appear in the same subject only in the next year as a compartmental candidate for the same part of examination provided his total chances for appearing in the said examination are not exhausted. However, a compartmental candidate of Part-III Examination will obtain consolidated mark sheet only after clearing examination in compartmental subject.

No. of Chances for Appearing in Final Examination

- a) A candidate shall register as an examinee at the Part-I examination within two consecutive academic sessions since the date of admission in the 1st year classes.
- b) Similarly he/she shall register as an examinee at the Part-II examination within two consecutive academic sessions after clearing Part-I examination. However, a special chance of one year may be given to the candidates for Part-II examination.
- c) Similarly he/she shall register as an examinee at the Part-III examination within two consecutive academic sessions after clearing Part-II examination.
- d) Once a candidate registers for the Part-I / Part-II / Part-III examination, he/she is not entitled to take fresh admission in a college for appearing in the concerned examination.
- e) The candidates who will not sit for B.A./B.Sc./8.Com.Part-I/Part-II/Part-III examination after being eligible to sit for the said examinations, the unsuccessful candidates and also the candidates who will cancel their result of the said examinations may appear for the same examination in the next year as casual candidates only provided his total chances for appearing in the said examination are not exhausted.
- f) A student must attend at least 75% of total number of lectures delivered in the class in each subject, failing which he/she will not be permitted to sit for the final examination.

Re-examination of Answer Scripts

- a) The eligible candidates may apply to the Controller of examination in the prescribed form for re-examination of his/her answer papers (theory papers only) within 15 (fifteen) days on and from the date of publication of results with requisite fees prescribed by the authority.
- b) A candidate of General course will have the option of getting his/her answer scripts reexamined (theory papers only) for one paper in Part-I, two papers in Part-II, one paper in Part-III and any one paper of Comp. English, Comp. MIL & Comp. Env. Subjects provided he/she secures at least 40% marks in other papers excluding the paper/papers to be re-examined in each stage.
- c) A candidate of Honours course will have the option of getting his/her answer scripts reexamined (theory papers only) for one Hons. paper/one General paper in Part-I, two Hons. papers/ one Hons. paper and one General paper/ two General papers (one Hons paper and one General paper for lab. based Hons subjects) in Part-II, two Hons. papers

(one Hons. paper for lab. based Hons subjects) in Part-III and any one paper of Comp. English, Comp. MIL & Comp. Env. Subjects provided he/she secures at least 40% marks in aggregate excluding the paper/papers to be re- examined in each stage.

d) Percentage of marks would be calculated both for Hons. & General papers separately.

Cancellation of Result of Examination

Any candidate can apply for cancellation of his/her results to the controller of examinations for improvement of his/her results within 30 (thirty) working days since the publication of result / issue of mark sheet. In all cases, cancellation of the previous examination will be counted as one chance lost. Such candidate shall surrender their original mark sheet to the University along with application for cancellation.

ii. To counsel academically weak students and to play an important role in helping troubled Sabang Sajanikanta Mahavidyalaya

students to cope with academic, extra-academic and personal problems.

iii. To proactively try to identify problems of the general student populace and to bring them to the notice of the concerned authorities. The practice of Mentor-Mentee program endeavors to pursue these objectives by guiding the students by the teaching faculty who can act as a friend, philosopher and guide to them. Mentors of each department, selected by the teachers of the concerned department, play this role and are given the authority to pursue the mission of this programme. Each of them is assigned a group of students however, their role is limited to counseling and motivating them to better direction. As the Mahavidyalaya suffers from huge shortage of teaching faculty, the programme is in fledgling stage. Only programs like counseling, group discussions etc. are taken up.

STUDENTS' FEEDBACK REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF SANSKRIT

Department of Sanskrit held a meeting on 14.05.2017 to analyse the feedback given by the students regarding management, teachers' teaching abilities, syllabus completion, teaching through ICT etc to prepare a report and discussed in detail what action and measures could be taken on the basis of the report. In most cases we have been provided with satisfactory reviews and in a few cases we have some reviews that showed our little mismanagement. After close analysis we have taken some measures to ensure better management for teaching and learning process.

1. Context-Coverage of Syllabus:

Report: 92.41% of students said that (95%-100%) syllabus was covered. 7.59% students said that (80%-90%) syllabus was covered.

Analysis: i) Teachers helped the student to be prepared for the exam and they are happy to have their syllabus completed in time.

ii) We can't find proper reason for the complaint of minimum number of students perhaps their seldom absence from the class is the reason of their ignorance of the completion of the syllabus.

2. Work load of the Subject:

Report: i) 34.18% Student said that work load of the subject is very good.

ii) 65.82% Student said that work load of the subject is good.

Analysis: i) Teachers taken the class as per their work load. Extra class allotted coverage the course.

3. Applicability/relevance to real life situation:

Report: i) 55.7% Students are said that the courses are applicable to real life situation. They give 'A' grade to the relevance of the subject to real life. 32.91% of the students give 'B' grade to the relevance of the subject to real life situation.

10.1% of the students give 'C' grade to the relevance of the subject to real life

situation.

Analysis: i) Most of the subject is relevance to real life situation. We are always trying to relate the subject with real life situation and teach them in a proper way. But after seeing this feedback, we are call 10.1% students and discussed with them in this particular problem.

4. Relevance of the subject in Relation to the understanding of the major field:

Report: 55.7% of the student said that the subject is relevance to the relation of understanding in the major field and they provide 'A' grade in this regard.

41.77% of the student said that the subject is relevance to the relation of understanding in the major field and they provide 'B' grade in this regard.

2.53% of the student said that the subject is relevance to the relation of understanding in the major field and they provide 'C' grade in this regard.

Analysis:

After analysis the feedback in this regard we call 2.53% of the students who are not understanding the relevance of the subject in relation to the major field and discussed the problem with them.

5. Availability of text books:

Report: i) 72.15% of the students said that the text books are available in the central & departmental library as per their need and they provide 'A' grade on the availability of text books.

ii) 27.85% of the students said that the text books are available in the central & departmental library as per their need and they provide 'B' grade on the availability of text books.

Analysis: After analysis the feedback given by the students on the availability of text books in the central and departmental library, we discussed this in our departmental meeting and we asked the students of all the year to submit a booklist as per their need. Finally, we compiled all the booklist and send to the purchase committee of the college.

6. Relevance of the subject covered to the examination/tests:

Report: i) 56.96% of the students said that the subject covered to the examination. They provide 'A' grade on this particular parameter.

- ii) 37.97% of the students said that the subject covered not fully up to the examination. But most of the thing are covered till the examination. They provide 'B' grade on this particular parameter.
- iii) 5.06% of the students are provide 'C' grade. They are not satisfied fully about the subject covered to the tests.

Analysis: After analysis all the feedbacks we got from the students, we see that almost 90% of the students were satisfied with the syllabus coverage up to the examination. But 5.06% of the students who are not satisfied with the subject coverage may be not attend their classes properly.

7. Additional remedial teaching for better understanding of the subject:

Report: i) 55.7% of the students are said that the class provide additional remedial teaching for better understanding of the subject. They provide 'A' grade in this regards.

- ii) 40.51% of the students are said that the class provide additional remedial teaching for better understanding of the subject. They need more classes so they provide 'B' grade in this particular parameter.
- iii) 3.8% of the students are not agree that the class provide remedial teaching with their classes. So 'C' grade.

Analysis: After analysis all the feedbacks we got from the students, we see that almost 95% of the students were satisfied with the remedial teaching for better understanding of the subject. Very few students 3.8% are not satisfied with the additional remedial classes. We discussed this particular thing in our Departmental meeting and decided to take remedial classes in regularly.

8. Overall rating:

Report:

- i. 73.42% of the students are satisfied with all the things we are providing in our classes.
- ii. They are providing 'A" grade.

- iii. 25.32% of the students are provide 'B' Grade to all the things we provide.
- iv. 1.27% of the students are not satisfied properly. They give satisfactory & 'C' grade.

Analysis:

- It is quite impossible to us to satisfy all the students. But we are trying our level best.
 After analysis this
- o feedback we find out that it is quite natural that 99% of the students are satisfied with overall things but
- 1.27% students are not satisfied. But we are trying harder & harder that no one can give us 'C' grade.

Gender sensitization programmes arranged:

The IQAC Cell proposed the Department of Political Science to conduct a seminar on gender sensitization as early as possible.

Training to the staffs to enhance the efficiency regarding the use of e-resource. The support staffs are allowed to attend any training programme, like training organized by the Government of West Bengal, college or other institute for augmenting their performance.
